MISSION

The mission of Dodge Nature Preschool is to provide premier early childhood environmental education which meets children's developmental needs while initiating them into a lifelong, meaningful relationship with the natural world.

ABOUT US

We believe young children thrive in child-centered environments that support play and inquiry. Our curriculum is driven by the interests of the children and framed by the natural cycle of the seasons. In our program, children build knowledge through first-hand experiences with nature, classroom materials, and—most importantly—their relationships with peers and caring adults.



EDUCATIONAL PHILOSOPHY

Dodge Nature Preschool offers a nature-based, emergent curriculum that supports the development of the whole child. We ensure that children are active participants in their own learning. Children's learning is supported by:

- Individualizing instruction based on children's interests and abilities
- Providing opportunities for social interactions and developing friendship skills
- Encouraging problem solving and reflection by asking open-ended questions and valuing children's ideas, insights, and concerns
- Creating an environment that encourages discovery, experimentation, and the opportunity to see the results of ones actions
- Grouping in mixed-age classes to give children the opportunity to learn from and teach each other, much as it would occur naturally in multiple-child families

HIGHLY-QUALIFIED TEACHING STAFF

Positive teacher-child relationships promote children's learning, social competence, and emotional development. Dodge Nature Preschool values its team of skilled and professional educators. Teachers have training in education and hold degrees in various fields including early childhood education, psychology, environmental science, and art. They are certified in CPR and First Aid and participate annually in professional development to meet the standards of NAEYC accreditation and state licensing. Classrooms are staffed with two lead teachers and one assistant teacher. This high teacher-to-student ratio (3:18) allows for children's learning to take place in small groups.



DIVERSITY

Dodge Nature Preschool welcomes all families and values diversity in the broadest sense including ethnicity, ability, gender identity, gender expression, family structure, sexual orientation, socioeconomic circumstances and religion. Our school seeks to promote equitable access to nature-based early childhood education for all communities, especially those for whom access has been denied historically. We acknowledge our responsibility to work to challenge bias and prejudice and listen to the voices of our community.



PRESCHOOL FACILITY

The Dodge Nature Preschool building is designed to provide the best possible preschool environment for young children. The welcoming entrance encourages family involvement and smooth transitions from home to school. Spacious classrooms allow for the busy, active play of preschool children, with special attention to acoustics and temperature. Open-ended equipment and supplies encourage creative and cooperative learning. The large multipurpose room provides space for very active play. An outdoor play area features climbing structures, swings, slides, a large sandbox, a mud kitchen, vegetable and flower gardens, and a variety of loose parts.

DODGE NATURE CENTER

Dodge Nature Center's 110-acre environmental education preserve provides children opportunities to discover the wonder and beauty of prairies, ponds, and woodland trails. They regularly visit Dodge Nature Center's model farm where they interact with barnyard animals, plant vegetable gardens, and enjoy the harvest in the summer and fall. Naturalists from Dodge Nature Center engage children in beekeeping, honey making and maple sugaring. Picking raspberries and tasting apples picked right from the tree encourage children to explore the connections between their lives and the world of nature.

LICENSING

Dodge Nature Preschool is licensed by the Minnesota Department of Human Services (DHS), and has received a 4 Star Parent Aware Rating from the Minnesota Department of Education. We are also accredited by the National Association for the Education of Young Children (NAEYC). We are a certified Nature Explore Classroom committed to providing nature-rich outdoor learning spaces.







SCHOLARSHIP

A scholarship fund is available to families who need assistance with tuition. This may be ongoing support or temporary help due to a change in circumstances for a family. Scholarship funds are made possible by parent fundraising, gifts from corporate donors, and earnings from the preschool endowment fund. Dodge Nature Preschool also accepts the Pathway 1 Early Learning Scholarship.

A Day at Dodge Nature Preschool

At Dodge Nature Preschool we value spontaneity in activity and take advantage of the "teachable moment." We also know that many people, especially young children first experiencing regular activity away from home, benefit from knowing what will happen next. We maintain a flexible schedule, with predictable events throughout the day such as snack and group experiences, to give children the security of routine.

The following two pages are an example of a classroom schedule that has an outside start (during non-pandemic times). An inside start will follow this schedule in reverse.

Arrival

Parents bring children into the classroom already dressed in outdoor gear appropriate for the season, sign children in, and are greeted by the teacher.

Outside Time

Children play on the playground or take a hike on the Dodge Nature Center grounds.



Playground activities include

- Swinging on the swings
- Water & sand play in the sandbox
- Journaling, writing & drawing
- "Cooking" in the mud kitchen
- Playing games of chase and hide & seek
- Planting & harvesting the preschool garden
- Playing house, superheroes, and other dramatic play
- Building a snow fort
- Relaxing & reading stories

Dodge Nature Center activities include:

- Visiting the Model Farm
- Playing in the woods
- Hiking the trails and boardwalk
- Harvesting or planting the gardens
- Looking for tadpoles in the ponds
- Kick sledding or boot skating on the Farm Pond
- Searching for butterflies in the prairies
- Learning about bees and honey at the apiary
- Handling and learning about reptiles and amphibians in the lab



Snack Time

Children prepare for snack by washing hands and helping set tables. Teachers and children usually eat "family style," serve food, converse, and enjoy each other's company.

Indoor Play

Children have a long block of uninterrupted time to choose an activity. This allows children to lengthen attention span and develop competency with activities. Classroom activities for children to choose from include:



- Art activities painting, drawing, or collage
- Science activities observing animals or experimenting with color mixing
- Sensory activities engaging in water play or sculpting with clay
- Writing activities creating a book or writing in story journals
- Reading activities listening to a story or playing with puppets
- Dramatic play activities playing family or pretending to be a firefighter
- Math and manipulative activities completing puzzles or playing board games
- Blocks and building activities creating with blocks, Legos or Magna-Tiles
- Music and movement activities playing instruments or dancing to music
- Real work activities watering plants, setting the table or sweeping the floor
- Life-skill activities preparing food for snack or helping with pet care
- Adult-directed activities cooking applesauce or planting seeds

Clean-up

Children learn to take responsibility for themselves and the classroom by putting away materials and helping prepare for group time. Children look through picture books before group time begins.

Group Time

Children take part in whole – group, community-building activities:

- Listen to stories
- Sing songs together
- Act in each other's journal stories
- Celebrate birthdays with favorite books

Pickup Time

Children welcome their grown-ups back to the classroom, ready to say goodbye until next time.

Frequently Asked Questions

about the Dodge Nature Preschool *Program*



How do I apply?

\$75.00 NON-REFUNDABLE application fee. All applications received during the priority period in January will be randomly numbered and placed in a lottery. Currently-enrolled and returning families are given priority in placement. After these placements are made, new families are placed. In addition, placements are made in consideration of optimal learning conditions, such as class balance of age, gender, ethnicity and other forms of diversity. An effort will be made to grant each family's first choice for days and times. A non-refundable deposit will be required to hold placement. This payment will be applied to the May tuition only. This deposit is non-refundable regardless of child's attendance. Applications received after the priority period will be considered in the order in which they are received.

What ages are the children at Dodge Nature Preschool?

Dodge Nature Preschool welcomes children ages three to five-years-old into our mixed-age classrooms. Children must be 3 by September 1 to enroll in the priority placement.

Are children really outside every day?

Yes. We go outside every day that it is safe to be outside: sunny, rainy, cold, snowy, muddy, hot. Being in nature is our passion. As we say at Dodge, "There is no bad weather, only bad gear."

What do children wear to be outside every day?

Our parent handbook provides a full list of recommended gear for each season. Below is a short example of the gear list. We have gear for borrowing for families who forget gear on a given day. If you cannot afford gear, please talk to your teacher.

Fall / Spring / SummerWinterRain bootsSnow pantsRain jacketBootsRain pantsWaterproof mittens

Light gloves* Scarf/Neck warmer
Second layer (fleece/vest)* Hat/Ear covers

Closed-Toe Indoor Shoes Second layer (fleece/vest)
Wool/Fleece socks

* When needed for colder weather Snow jacket/ Coat

Do you offer Full-Day programs?

We do not offer a full-day program. Classes run two hours and 45 minutes in the morning or in the afternoon. You may not register for mornings, lunch bunch and afternoons. Children would need rest/nap time to have a full-day program, and we do not have rest time.

What about potty training?

Children should be potty-trained before starting preschool at Dodge Nature Preschool. If your child isn't yet potty-trained, you are still encouraged to apply during the priority period. We understand that potty training takes time and children will have accidents, but they should be well on the road to fully potty-trained.

Frequently Asked Questions about Dodge Nature Preschool *Philosophy*

How do we build early literacy and math skills, preparing children for kindergarten?

- We read to children.
- We speak to children in complex language and support conversation skills.
- We sing together learning the basics of rhyming and phonetics.
- We teach children how to handle books gently and provide time to look at books independently.
- We model writing for children—story dictation, the "List" of activities, etc.
- We offer opportunities to measure filling containers of different sizes, building block towers as tall as children, finding the creek depth with a stick.
- We count together the number of children in a hiking group, the quantity
 of food at snack, the number of butterflies in the prairie today, etc.
- We provide a wide array of manipulative toys that allow children to make patterns, sort, and classify items.
- We play games that build visual discrimination skills, like "Who's Missing?"
- We sing songs that include counting forwards and backwards, like "Five Green and Speckled Frogs," "One Little Bird," etc.





How do we teach life skills (empathy, sharing, patience, inclusion, etc.)?

- We offer unlimited opportunities to practice in a social setting.
- We work in mixed age groups with children teaching each other.
- We support and model problem solving.
- We allow time to work on projects and develop skills.
- We express our own feelings and admit our mistakes.
- We take advantage of teachable moments.
- We listen to children.
- We set high, but reasonable, expectations.

How do we handle discipline?

- We set clear expectations and limits.
- We accommodate personal needs.
- We see the good in all children.
- We follow through to the end.
- We allow children to experience natural and logical consequences when appropriate.
- We work to keep the difference clear between requests and directions. For instance, cleaning up after playing is not a choice.
